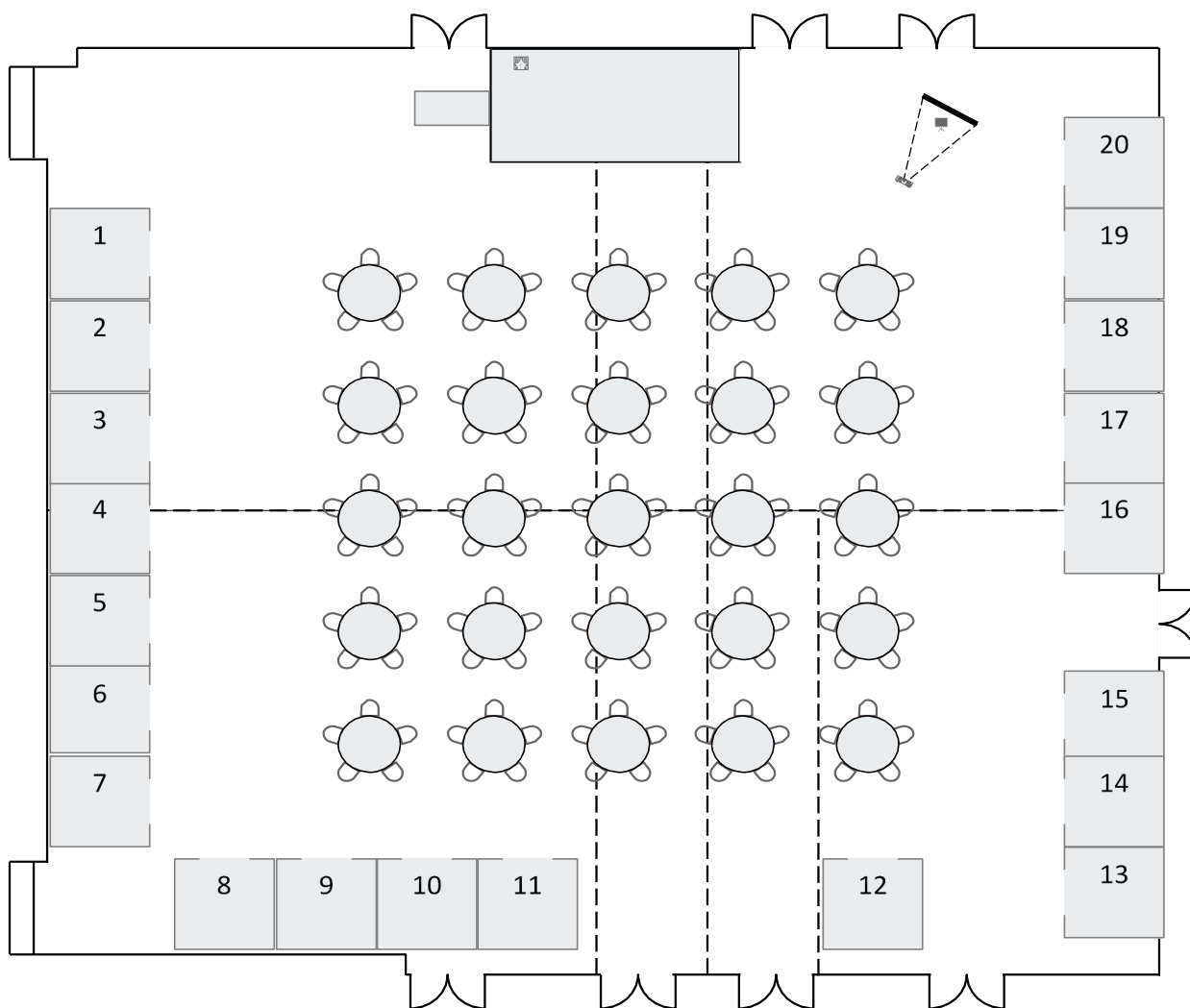

In Alphabetical Order

Rosie Andueza is a Program Manager for the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare's Division of Behavioral Health (DBH). In her role, Rosie manages federal and state funding for public Substance Use Disorder (SUD) services. She also works closely with DBH field staff on issues involving adult and children's mental health service delivery in Idaho. Rosie currently sits on the NASADAD board of directors as the Region 10 representative and Secretary as well as on the Idaho Behavioral Health State Planning Council and the ICAAD (Idaho Conference on Alcohol and Drug Dependency) Board.

Rosie is a graduate of the University of Oregon (go Ducks!) and the Idaho Certified Public Manager's program. As a person in long-term recovery, Rosie's passion is to combat the stigma that surrounds this disease and unnecessarily keeps people from getting help and finding a life of recovery.

Rosie has two teenagers who occupy her free time (and frequently trouble her usually calm mind). She also takes pleasure in traveling, reading, the outdoors and just enjoying life, one day at a time.

Deepa Avula is the Director of the Office of Financial Resources (OFR) within the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). As Director of OFR, Ms. Avula is responsible for formulating SAMHSA's more than \$3 billion dollar budget, including funding for block and discretionary grant programs and program management. Prior to assuming this role, Ms. Avula worked for the Office of the Chief Financial Officer in the Office of Justice Programs (OJP), and she served in several capacities in SAMHSA's Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT), including Chief of the Quality Improvement and Workforce Development Branch where she provided leadership on programs related to workforce development in the behavioral health field, the provision of recovery support services, the development of quality measures for behavioral health and health financing. Ms. Avula holds a Master's degree in Public Health from the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill and a Bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice from The George Washington University.

Allison F. Bauer, JD, LICSW is the Director of the Bureau of Substance Addiction Services (BSAS) of the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, having begun her tenure in December, 2016. Previously, Allison served as Senior Director of The Boston Foundation and as the Staff Director/Chief Counsel for the Joint Committee on Mental Health & Substance Abuse in the MA House of Representatives. In 2010, she was selected to the inaugural class of the Terrance Keenan Institute "Emerging Leader in Health Philanthropy Fellow" by Grant-makers in Health. Currently an adjunct professor at Boston College Graduate School of Social Work, Allison also taught at the Simmons College School of Social Work and was an assistant professor at Virginia Commonwealth University School of Social Work, where she earned her MSW. She has an undergraduate degree from the University of Rochester and holds a JD from the University of Pennsylvania Law School. Allison currently serves on the Advisory Board of Playworks New England and acts as a strategic advisor to Positive Tracks.

Barbara Bazron, PhD, is the Deputy Secretary of the Maryland Department of Health's Behavioral Health. She is responsible for the provision of a full array of community clinical and support services, in addition to managing five psychiatric hospitals and two Regional Institutions for Children and Adolescents. She formerly served as the Interim Director and Senior Deputy Director of Behavioral Health in the District of Columbia. She oversaw children and youth and adult services, emergency and disaster planning, housing, forensic services, care coordination services and provider relations. She was responsible for developing and managing the government operated urgent care clinics and specialty services.

She has over 20 years' experience in executive leadership positions in education, mental health and addictions. She has clinical experience as a family therapist and as an educational diagnostician.

She received her doctorate from the University of Pittsburgh, Master's from the University of Cincinnati and Bachelors from Oberlin College.

James Carroll, JD, serves as Acting Director of the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP). Previously, he served as Deputy Chief of Staff for the Administration. Prior to joining the Trump Administration, Acting Director Carroll served as the Director of Corporate Compliance and Washington Counsel for Ford Motor Company.

Jennifer Corvalan-Wood is the Director of Community Prevention and Early Intervention, with the Colorado Department of Human Services, Office of Behavioral Health, Community Prevention and Early Intervention Programs. She comes to this role with over 20 years of experience in the field of behavioral health. As Director she is responsible for managing the prevention services unit at OBH. She also works at the national level with other state prevention directors, the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Center for Substance Abuse Prevention (CSAP), National Association of State Alcohol and Drug Abuse Directors (NASADAD) National Prevention. Jennifer also serves as the Colorado Representative to the National Prevention Network. Prior to her role at OBH she worked in the juvenile justice system for 18 years and at a substance use detoxification facility for 3 years. She holds a senior level national and state addictions counseling certification and is a certified prevention specialist.

Ute Gazioch currently serves as the Director of Substance Abuse and Mental Health for the Florida Department of Children and Families. Previously she served as Mental Health Lead, responsible for the oversight of statewide grants and programs as well as providing programmatic expertise to develop adult and children's behavioral health policy. Prior to joining the Department in 2012, Ms. Gazioch spent 16 years working with adults, children, and families in the child welfare and behavioral health fields. Ms. Gazioch has extensive experience with direct care provision as well as program development, management and evaluation. She has trained providers and system partners on System of Care Principles, Wraparound and Stepping Stones to Recovery. Ms. Gazioch earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Psychology with a minor in Social Work from Florida State University.

Sara Goldsby, a native of Wyoming, was confirmed as Director of DAODAS by the South Carolina Senate on February 8, 2018, after being appointed Acting Director by Governor Nikki Haley in August 2016, then nominated as Director by Governor Henry McMaster in May 2017. As Director, she has led South Carolina's response to the opioid crisis and currently serves as co-chair of the State Opioid Emergency Response Team. Under her leadership, DAODAS has been instrumental in addressing the opioid crisis in South Carolina. With passion around social determinants of health and access to care, Director Goldsby earned her Master of Social Work and Master of Public Health degrees – with an emphasis on health services, policy, and management – from the University of South Carolina in 2015, winning awards in both programs for outstanding student achievement and leadership. She continues to work with the Institute for Healthcare Improvement Open School.

Holly Hagle, PhD, is the Co-Director of the National ATTC Network Coordinating Office where she oversees the implementation of a 1 million dollar national network, the Addiction Technology Transfer Center (ATTC). She is the Principal Investigation on behalf of the ATTC Network for the Opioid State Targeted Response Technical Assistance, a 4 million dollar grant funded by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA).

Dr. Hagle was the Director of the SAMHSA-funded National Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment Addiction Technology Transfer Center (National SBIRT ATTC) at the Institute for Research, Education, and Training in Addictions (IRETA). Dr. Hagle has been actively working with medical and behavioral health providers for more than 15 years. As the Director of the National SBIRT ATTC she provided oversight of all training and educational initiatives, curriculum development and project coordination for three HRSA SBIRT federally funded projects with the University of Pittsburgh School of Nursing since 2006. Additionally, Dr. Hagle is an Assistant Research Professor in the School of Nursing and Health Studies at the University of Missouri-Kansas City. Dr. Hagle will serve as on the Steering Committee and offer in-kind support to provide subject matter expertise on workforce development, practice implementation, and direct delivery training and training of trainers activities.

Steve Hanson, M.S.Ed., is the Associate Commissioner of Treatment for the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services. He is responsible for the oversight of state operated treatment programs, adolescent services, criminal justice and Recovery services.

Steve has been with OASAS since April 2001 when he was appointed as the Director at our John L. Norris Addiction Treatment Center in Rochester. In 2007, he was named Director of the Bureau of Addiction Treatment Centers, and in 2009 he was named Director of Treatment Services.

Steve has over 30 years of experience in the field as a treatment provider, educator and consultant. His ability to train criminal justice practitioners on drug abuse and treatment has been recognized both nationally and internationally. He has been a faculty member of the National Drug Court Institute/National Association of Drug Court Professionals for 15 years.

Frances Harding is the Director of the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention (CSAP). Director Harding serves as the lead for SAMHSA's Strategic Initiative on Prevention of Substance Abuse and Mental Illness, which creates environments where youth, adults, families, communities, and systems are motivated and empowered to manage their overall emotional, behavioral, and physical health. In addition to representing SAMHSA on interagency efforts to prevent underage drinking, prescription drug misuse and abuse, and marijuana use among youth and young adults, Director Harding collaborates with SAMHSA's Center for Mental Health Services (CMHS) on program and policy issues related to the connection between substance abuse prevention and mental health promotion.

Director Harding has held numerous national positions, including serving as president of the National Prevention Network (NPN), and as New York State's representative to the NASADAD Board of Directors.

Jessica Hawkins serves as NPN for Oklahoma and is the Prevention Services Director for the Oklahoma Dept. of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services. She is currently the Vice President of Internal Affairs for the NPN Executive Committee.

Tom Hill began at the National Council for Behavioral Health in March 2017 and currently serves as Vice President of Practice Improvement. Tom previously served as a Presidential Appointee in the position of Senior Advisor on Addiction and Recovery to the SAMHSA Administrator. As part of this post, Tom initially served as Acting Director of the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment. Prior to his appointment, he was a Senior Associate at Altarum Institute, serving as Technical Assistance Director for a number of SAMHSA treatment and recovery support grant initiatives. He also served for four years as Director of Programs at Faces & Voices of Recovery. Reflecting his commitment to the goal of long-term recovery for individuals, families, and communities, Tom has also served on numerous Boards of Directors, advisory boards, committees, and task force/working groups. He is the recipient of numerous awards including the Johnson Institute America Honors Recovery Award, the NALGAP Advocacy Award, and a Robert Wood Johnson Fellowship in the Developing Leadership in Reducing Substance Abuse initiative.

Daryl W. Kade, MA, serves as Director of the Center for Behavioral Health Statistics and Quality (CBHSQ). The NASADAD Annual Meeting is an excellent opportunity to meet with senior State officials across the US that are responsible for oversight and funding of public sector substance use disorder treatment, recovery, and prevention services. Those attending include State Agency Directors as well as senior officials responsible for prevention (Prevention Coordinators Learning Community), treatment and recovery (Treatment Coordinators Learning Community) and women's services (Women's Services Coordinators Learning Community).



National Association of State Alcohol and Drug Abuse Directors, Inc. (NASADAD)

The Association membership is comprised of senior State and Territorial officials responsible for management State-supported substance use disorder (SUD) prevention, treatment, and recovery services. NASADAD is a private, not-for-profit educational, scientific, and informational organization whose basic purpose is to foster and support the development and provision of effective publicly supported SUD services throughout every State and Territory. The Washington, D.C. office is headed by an Executive Director, and includes divisions concerned with Public Policy, as well as Research and Program Applications.

Prevention Coordinators' Learning Community

The Prevention Coordinators include State Alcohol and Drug Prevention Professionals and other individuals dedicated to comprehensive and effective programs for preventing the misuse of alcohol and other drugs. They work closely with the State Opioid Treatment Authorities Learning Community to promote safe, effective, and efficient medication-assisted treatment (MAT) for persons with Opioid Use Disorders (OUDs), as well as with their colleagues in the Women's Services Coordinators' Learning Community.

Women's Services Coordinators' Learning Community

The Women's Services Coordinators are dedicated to the development and promotion of evidence-based practices that address the unique alcohol and other drug prevention, treatment, and recovery service needs of women and their families throughout their lifespan.
