



Our Team





Ending the Opioid and Stimulant Crisis

ORN supports **Prevention, Treatment and Recovery** efforts. For example:

- Building awareness
- Decreasing stigma
- Supporting the planning and implementation of overdose prevention efforts (e.g., naloxone, medications for opioid use disorders)
- Strengthening collaboration between justice and public safety entities and treatment and recovery agencies
- Planning and implementing new models of care





Ending the Opioid and Stimulant Crisis

- In Maryland provided training for a recovery community organization to create a step-down and halfway house for LGBTQ+ individuals with opioid use disorder.
- In **Tennessee** supported a judge in a rural community to develop an implementation plan to start providing all FDA approved medications for treating opioid use disorder in a community jail.
- In Alaska convened virtual trainings on prevention programming for tribal leaders from 42 villages.
- In West Virginia provided training and educational resources for a clinic on how to incorporate substance use disorder services into their practice serving a faith-based community.
- In **Ohio** provided a certified recovery housing organization with best practices to help them implement peer support services.



Overall Impact to Date

Established in 2018, the Opioid Response Network is funded by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). ORN partners representing over 2 million constituents have already made a significant difference and our impact continues to grow every day.
