She holds a Masters of Nursing Science from the UAMS and a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Arkansas State University. Shuler serves as Region 6 Representative on the Opioid Treatment Network (OTN) Executive Committee with NASADAD.

CoE-IHS Webinar: Effective State Integration Models: Hub and Spoke and Bridge

NASADAD and the National Council for Mental Wellbeing's Center of Excellence for Integrated Health Solutions (CoE-IHS) hosted a webinar on State models that integrate recovery and support services to bolster clinical and recovery outcomes for those with opioid use disorder (OUD). This webinar highlighted two effective State integration models used today; California's CA Bridge Program and Tennessee's Hub and Spoke Model. Specifically, the webinar reviewed the State models' core components, functions, staffing, and service activities; strategies for integrating medication for opioid use disorder (MOUD) into primary care and community organizations; the role of peer recovery support staff on integrated care teams; and the

White House Happenings

ONDCP Releases Report on SUD in Pregnancy

The White House Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) recently released <u>Substance Use Disorder in Pregnancy: Improving</u> <u>Outcomes for Families</u>. The report outlines how overdose-related deaths in pregnant and postpartum women can be prevented with evidence-based treatment for opioid use disorder (OUD) like buprenorphine and methadone.

The report also describes the systemic and cultural barriers that make accessing care difficult and outlines key actions the Biden-Harris Administration will take to connect pregnant women with substance use disorder to care through actions to:

- "Develop coordinated training and technical assistance to inform the use of medications for SUD treatment for grantee recipients of the Department of Justice's Office of Juvenile Programs (OJP) Family Treatment Court Program and the Department of Health and Human Services' (HHS) Substance Abuse and Mental Health Administration (SAMHSA) drug treatment court programs.
- Offer SUD education to women's health primary care providers throughout the Veterans Health Administration (VHA).
- Enhance transparency by publicly reporting data on access to SUD treatment for pregnant and postpartum women nationwide using data obtained from Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant (SAPT BG) related the number of

waivered buprenorphine prescribers who self-report as obstetricians and midwives.

- Expand access to medications for OUD for pregnant women and women of reproductive age within Tribal nations and living in Tribal communities.
- Provide grants to foster partnerships between hospitals and community-based organizations to implement evidence-based interventions that strengthen perinatal and postnatal support structures for individuals with SUD through HHS's Office on Women's Health (OWH).
- Hire a dedicated Associate Administrator for Women's Services in HHS's SAMHSA to lead its efforts focused on pregnancy and the postpartum period.
- Develop model national certification standards for peer recovery support specialists as part of the implementation of the President's <u>National Drug Control</u> <u>Strategy</u> and his <u>mental health strategy</u>.
- Reduce the incidence and impact of neonatal abstinence syndrome (NAS), a drug withdrawal syndrome that occurs shortly after an infant is born.
- Improve maternal mental health and outcomes for pregnant, lactating, and postpartum women with SUD."

COVID-19 Public Health Emergency Extension

On October 13, Xavier Becerra, Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), renewed the <u>COVID-19 public health emergency declaration</u>.

CMS Releases New Resource for States on the Optional COVID-19 Group Coverage



The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS)

recently released a <u>resource</u> for States that adopted the optional COVID-19 Medicaid eligibility group on ending coverage when federal authority for the group expires on the last day of the COVID-19 public health emergency (PHE). The new resource discusses the coverage of the optional COVID-19 group, redetermination and notice strategies for COVID-19 group beneficiaries, and expectations for ending coverage in the group in States' unwinding plans, as well as renewal distributions and data reporting.

SAMHSA Funding Opportunity: Cooperative Agreements for Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic Planning Grants

The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), announced a new <u>funding opportunity</u> for States to develop <u>Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHCs</u>). Adding to the \$296.2 million HHS recently awarded to communities to <u>develop new CCBHCs</u> and <u>enhance existing clinics</u>, \$15 million in new grants will be awarded to 15 recipients in one year. These cooperative agreements aim to support States' development of CCBHC certification systems, Prospective Payment Systems (PPS) for Medicaid's reimbursable services, and applications to participate in a four-year CCBHC Demonstration program. Eligible entities include State Mental Health Authorities (SMHAs), Single State Agencies (SSAs), and State Medicaid Agencies (SMAs), including the District of Columbia. The application deadline is Monday, December 19, 2022.

States must receive a CCBHC planning grant to be eligible for the demonstration program. Ten States already received one-year planning grants from HHS. The remaining ones can still apply. In early 2023, up to 15 States will be awarded up to \$1 million for one-year planning grants, and from those, ten will be selected for the demonstration, starting in 2024.

12th Annual National Red Ribbon Week Photo Contest Accepting Submissions

Submissions are still open for the <u>12th Annual National Red Ribbon</u> <u>Week Photo Contest</u>. The contest aims to raise visibility for living drug-free and will be held in conjunction with <u>National Red Ribbon</u> <u>Week</u>, the largest substance use disorder (SUD) prevention campaign in the United States. Participants decorate the front of their homes or school campuses with double-looped red ribbons and must



incorporate this year's Red Ribbon theme: Celebrate Life. Live Drug Free.[™] Twenty winners will be selected from both home and school entries and be awarded \$1,000 for the school of their choice and an Apple iPad for personal use. The event is co-sponsored by the National Family Partnership (NFP) and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA).

Participants must be 18 years old to enter. The contest ends November 1, 2022, at 9:00 p.m. (ET). The voting period is November 2, 2022- November 16, 2022. Winners will be announced on December 2, 2022.

23rd National Prescription Drug Take Back Day Announced for October 29th

The Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), in partnership with the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and the Office of



National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP), announced that Saturday, October 29, 2022, from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm, local time, is the <u>23rd National Prescription Drug Take Back Day</u>. Take Back Day is an opportunity to anonymously drop off prescription drugs for safe, proper disposal at DEA collection locations. These locations can be searched for anonymously on the DEA site, <u>here</u>. Due to COVID-19 concerns, different geographic locations may have different levels of participation. 2022 NIDA-NIAAA Frontiers in Addiction Research Mini-Convention

The National Institutes of Health's (NIH) National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) and National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) will host the <u>annual NIDA-NIAAA Frontiers in Addiction Research Mini-Convention</u> on topics of emerging scientific interest in neuroscience and addiction research. This no-cost, 2-day virtual meeting will be held from November 1, 2022, at 11:00 am (ET) to November 2, 2022, at 3:00 pm (ET). The Mini-Convention will also highlight research by premier early stage or junior investigators in the fields of alcohol and substance use disorder (SUD) research through the <u>Early Career Investigator Showcase (ECIS) symposium</u>. The virtual meeting will offer a keynote address by the recipient of the annual Jacob P. Waletzky Memorial Award, given to a young scientist (within 15 years of their Ph.D. or MD degree) whose research has led to significant conceptual/empirical contributions to the understanding of SUD.
