At the LGE, she was promoted to serve as the Director of Corporate Compliance, overseeing contract monitoring and departmental observance of policies and procedures to ensure compliance with federal and state licensing, CARF accreditation standards, and agency policy and procedures. She also evaluated clinical practices in this role.

Melinda came to the Louisiana Office of Behavioral Health as the Louisiana State Opioid Response (LaSOR) Project Director in January 2021 before moving into her current role as the Director of Non-Medicaid and LGE Compliance in November 2022. In this position, Melinda is responsible for administrative and programmatic oversight of programs and initiatives supported by the state, including programs addressing gambling disorders and pregnant women. She is also responsible for the monitoring, technical assistance, and evaluation of the comprehensive treatment system for adults related to mental health and substance use disorders in Louisiana.

She serves on various local, state, and national boards, committees, and commissions,

including NASADAD's Women's Service Network (WSN) as the Women's Service Coordinator (WSC) for the state of Louisiana.

Capitol Hill Happenings

Bipartisan, Bicameral Group of Legislators Announce the Introduction of the Department of Defense Overdose Data Act

On May 30, the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (HELP) Subcommittee on Primary Health and Retirement Security announced the introduction of the bipartisan, bicameral Department of Defense Overdose Data (DOD) Act (S.1766, H.R. 3751). The act would "...require the Department of Defense to provide an annual public report outlining fatal and non-fatal overdoses among service members and military families, address barriers to care for substance use disorder (SUD), and expand access to overdose prevention tools like naloxone, a nasal spray capable of reversing a fatal opioid overdose, and fentanyl test strips."

The legislation was introduced by Subcommittee Chairman Chair Edward J. Markey (D-MA), alongside Senators Lisa Murkowski (R-AL), Elizabeth Warren (D-MA), Mike Braun (R-IN), and Representatives Seth Moulton (D-MA-06) and Nancy Mace (R-DC-01). CDC Releases New Dashboards To Help Track Nonfatal Overdose Trends



The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) released two new dashboards to help track nonfatal overdose trends around the country. One of these dashboards, the Drug Overdose Surveillance

and Epidemiology (DOSE) Dashboard, is an "...interactive data visualization tool that displays current nonfatal drug overdose-related ED and hospital discharge data." Data from this dashboard can be helpful in analyzing US nonfatal overdose trends "...for any of the four drug overdose types (i.e., all drugs, all opioids, heroin, and all stimulants); by participating state and by county (county-level data are only available for nonfatal all drug overdose ED visits); and by sex and age group."

Additionally, the CDC's new <u>Fentanyl Study Toxicology Testing Dashboard</u> "...provides data on the amount of fentanyl, fentalogs, and other substance combinations present in blood samples from people hospitalized with a suspected opioid-involved overdose across 10 study sites." This dashboard is intended to be used to "...inform intervention and response to polysubstance use."

The Syndemic Solutions Summit: A Collaborative Approach to Advancing Health Services



The Collaborative to Advance Health Services (CAHS), housed within the University of Missouri-Kansas City (UMKC) School of Nursing and Health Studies, announced the first Syndemic Solutions Summit. The two-day summit will be held in person at The Kauffman Foundation Conference Center in Kansas City, MO, and will focus on "...discussing and generating solutions for syndemic approaches to end the intertwined health conditions of 5 epidemics: HIV; STIs; Viral Hepatitis; Substance Use Disorders and Mental health; and Reproductive and Sexual Health."

The summit will take place from July 26-27 and aims to "...create a neutral space for government, the workforce, and people with lived experience to learn and listen, and collaboratively chart the path forward." Research Round-Up

NIDA Supports Research on Novel Approaches for Smoking Cessation

National Institute on Drug Abuse

The National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) has funded the development of several promising new treatment approaches for smoking cessation. One of these projects includes a preclinical study, by NIDA with Antidote Therapeutics, Inc., of

"...a human monoclonal antibody that binds to nicotine in the blood to prevent it from interacting with nicotinic receptors in the brain." Other projects include studies of noninvasive brain stimulation, the safety and efficacy of an infusion of ketamine for tobacco use disorder, "...a multi-site randomized controlled trial of the psychedelic drug psilocybin for tobacco use disorder, and trials of compounds with novel mechanisms of action in the brain." NIDA is also funding studies to help identify those who would benefit from targeted prevention interventions and addressing smoking-related health disparities.

NIDA also recognizes the need to develop smoking cessation therapies for youth. NIDA issued a \$3 million <u>funding opportunity</u> announcement with the National Cancer Institute (NCI) and are seeking "...initial studies that could lead to the design and development of behavioral smoking interventions for adolescents between 14 and 20 years old." Applications are due by October 15, 2023.
