NASADAD Participates in SAMHSA Regional Meeting Focused on Recovery

On August 8 and 9, Robert Morrison, NASADAD

Executive Director, attended a meeting in Chicago, Illinois sponsored by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) <u>Office of</u> <u>Recovery (OR)</u> where States in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' (HHS) Region 5 (Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, Wisconsin, and Minnesota) held a dialogue regarding different issues related to recovery support services. SAMHSA's Office of Recovery is led by Paolo DelVecchio. The meeting allowed participants the opportunity to hear presentations and engage in a dialogue about



successes, challenges, and ways forward to improve access to recovery support services. Participants spent time together in a larger group and breakout sessions. The discussions touched on many key topics impacting States, counties, and communities, including workforce, data collection, recovery schools, research-to-practice and practice-to-research issues, financing, and more. NASADAD wishes to recognize SAMHSA for holding this dialogue.

Capitol Hill Happenings

Bipartisan, Bicameral Legislation Designed to Prevent Fatal Overdoses and Support Opioid Victims Reintroduced

On July 25th, the Improving Medicaid Programs' Response to Overdose Victims and Enhancing (IMPROVE) Addiction Care Act, a bipartisan, bicameral bill that would "...require state Medicaid programs to use jointly-funded Drug Utilization Review programs to help connect patients to treatment and boost safeguards for those on Medicaid who have experienced a non-fatal, opioid-related overdose" was reintroduced. The bill would also close an information gap that currently prevents prescribers from being informed when a patient overdoses. Senators Joe Manchin (D-WV), Markwayne Mullin (R-OK), Tom Carper (D-DE), and Marsha Blackburn (R-TN) reintroduced the legislation in the Senate, while Representatives David Trone (D-MD), Brian Fitzpatrick (R-PA), and Annie Kuster (D-NH) reintroduced companion legislation in the House.

SAMHSA Releases 2023-2026 Strategic Plan

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) recently released the <u>2023-2026 Strategic Plan</u>. The 2023-2026 Strategic Plan introduces a new mission and vision by prioritizing a person-centered approach with objectives associated with each priority and guiding principle. The five key priority areas include:



- "Preventing Substance Use and Overdose
- Enhancing Access to Suicide Prevention and Mental Health Services
- Promoting Resilience and Emotional Health for Children, Youth and Families
- Integrating Behavioral and Physical Health Care
- Strengthening the Behavioral Health Workforce."

Additionally, SAMHSA's work for 2023-2026 will be guided by four core principles:

- "Equity
- Trauma-Informed Approaches
- Recovery
- Commitment to Data and Evidence"

FDA Approves Second Over-the-Counter Naloxone Nasal Spray Product

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved RiVive, 3 milligram (mg) naloxone hydrochloride nasal spray for over-the-counter (OTC), nonprescription use for the treatment of an opioid overdose. RiVive joins <u>Narcan</u>, 4 mg naloxone hydrochloride nasal spray, as the second OTC naloxone nasal spray product approved by the FDA. The timeline for the availability and price of RiVive is still being determined by the manufacturer. CDC Recognizes National Fentanyl Prevention and Awareness Day[™] August 21

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) will observe the second annual <u>National Fentanyl Prevention and</u>



<u>Awareness Day</u>[™] on Monday, August 21, 2023. Established by <u>Facing Fentanyl</u>[™], a notfor-profit organization, National Fentanyl Prevention and Awareness Day[™] is dedicated to remembrance of "... loved ones lost to overdoses involving illegally made fentanyl, raise awareness of the dangers of fentanyl, and share ways to prevent fatal overdose." This day serves as an opportunity for fentanyl awareness organizations and affected families to highlight lived experiences and inform the youth and public on the dangers of fentanyl. CDC has also released <u>shareable resources</u> in support of National Fentanyl Prevention and Awareness Day[™] to educate the public on fentanyl-related overdose.

2024 Minority Fellowship Program for Addiction Counselors Now Accepting Applications

The National Board for Certified Counselors (NBCC), funded by a grant in collaboration with the Association for Addiction Professionals (NAADAC) and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), is accepting applications for the <u>2024</u> <u>Minority Fellowship Program for Addiction Counselors (MFP-AC)</u>. The MFP-AC pairs awardees with mentors in the substance use disorder (SUD) field and provides professional development resources, including travel to the NAADAC Annual Conference. The 2024 MFP-AC will award up to 40 masters'-level fellowships in addiction counseling worth \$15,000 each. NAADAC is accepting <u>applications</u> until September 30, 2023.

Research Round-Up

CRS Report: Clinical Fentanyl Testing

The Congressional Research Service (CRS) recently published a report on <u>Clinical Fentanyl Testing</u>. The report covers the regulation of clinical fentanyl tests, including primary oversight mechanisms, Food and Drug Administration (FDA)-



cleared commercialized tests, and policy considerations for the use of clinical fentanyl testing as one component of the nation's response to the opioid crisis. The report concludes that "on a population level, this testing would facilitate monitoring trends of illicit drug use across and within geographic areas, as well as evaluating relevant health outcomes and their correlation with clinical presentation and treatment."

- Apply actionable interventions to enhance overdose safety and prevention.
- Explore new products and resources to manage overdose."
