Carole Johnson, HRSA, Presents On HRSA's Federal Policy Priorities and Programs Related to Substance Use Disorder at NASADAD Annual Meeting

On June 28, NASADAD hosted Carole Johnson, Administrator of the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), for a federal policy session on HRSA's priorities and programs related to the substance use disorder (SUD) field as part of the NASADAD Annual Meeting. Administrator Johnson highlighted HRSA's programs that support the SUD workforce and discussed how they relate to the work of State alcohol and drug agency directors - chiefly around recruiting, training, and retaining the SUD workforce. The NASADAD Board, led by Sara Goldsby (S.C.), President, has identified workforce issues as a top priority. As a result, NASADAD continues to collaborate with HRSA to promote awareness for their SUD workforce programs, including the Substance Use Disorder Treatment and Recovery Loan Repayment Program (STAR LRP), the Behavioral Health Workforce Education and Training (BHWET) Program, and the National Health Service Corps (NHSC) Program.

To promote HRSA's efforts around SUD workforce, NASADAD recently wrote a letter of support for S.862, the Restoring

America's Health Care Workforce and Readiness Act, sponsored by Senators Richard (Dick) Durbin (D-IL) and Marco Rubio (R-FL).

If signed into law, this bill would reauthorize and increase funding for the NHSC through Fiscal Year 2026. The letter of support can be found on the NASADAD website, here, and the proposed bill S.862 can be found here.

Kristen Beronio, CMS, Presents On Improving Access to Substance Use Disorder Treatment at NASADAD Annual Meeting

On June 28th, at NASADAD's Annual Meeting, Kirsten Beronio who serves as the Senior Policy Advisor at the Center for Medicaid and CHIP Services (CMCS), presented on Improving Access to Substance Use Disorder Treatment. Her presentation focused on navigating the Public Health Emergency Unwinding; Medicaid 1115 waivers; contingency management; crisis services funding under CMS; school-based services; provider capacity; and extending and expanding certified community behavioral health clinics.

Vice President Harris Convenes State Attorneys General for Discussion on **Fentanyl**

Earlier this week, Vice President Kamala Harris convened several State Attorneys General for a discussion, moderated by White House Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) Director Dr. Rahul Gupta, around federal and State efforts to disrupt the illicit fentanyl supply and expand access to care for individuals at risk of overdose. The







roundtable discussed actions taken by the Biden-Harris Administration to help States tackle the opioid and overdose epidemic, including a <u>National Response Plan to Fentanyl</u> <u>Combined with Xylazine</u>, the <u>High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (HIDTA) Program</u>, State model laws to address substance use disorder (SUD)/overdose, <u>a non-fatal opioid</u> <u>overdose tracker</u>, and expanded access to SUD treatment for incarcerated individuals. Vice President Harris also announced nearly \$50 million in grants to be awarded by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to address the nation's overdose epidemic. The Vice President thanked the State Attorneys General for their leadership in expanding SUD prevention, treatment, harm reduction, and recovery services in their states. HELP Committee Markup Next Week

On July 26, at 10:30 a.m., the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (HELP) will hold a markup on a <u>bill</u> (not yet assigned an official number) to address the workforce crisis. Among the measures included in the bill are reinstating the Women's Addiction Services Leadership Institute (WASLI), funding for the National Health Service Corps (NHSC), and more.

Around the Agencies

HHS Awards \$47.8 Million in Grant Funding for Programs Designed to Address OUD, SUD, and Overdose



The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), <u>announced awards in five grant programs</u> designed to combat "...multiple facets of substance misuse and the nation's overdose epidemic," totaling up to \$47.8 million. The five grant programs, their awards, and funding totals can be found below:

- <u>Medication-Assisted Treatment-Prescription Drug and Opioid Addiction (MAT-PDOA)</u> Grant Program: 21 awards totaling up to \$18.4 million to help expand or enhance access to Medications for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD).
- <u>Emergency Department Alternatives to Opioids Demonstration Program</u>: 15 awards totaling up to \$7.4 million to develop and implement alternatives to opioids for pain management in hospitals and emergency department (ED) settings.
- <u>Sober Truth on Preventing Underage Drinking Act (STOP Act</u>)program: 50 awards totaling up to \$3 million to prevent and reduce alcohol use among youth and young adults ages 12-20 in communities throughout the United States.
- <u>Adult Reentry Program</u>: 34 awards totaling up to \$13.6 million to expand substance use disorder (SUD) treatment and related recovery and reentry services to sentenced adults in the criminal justice system who have SUDs or co-occurring

substance use and mental disorders.

• <u>State Pilot Grant Program for Treatment for Pregnant and Postpartum Women</u>: six awards totaling up to \$5.4 million: to support family-based services for pregnant and postpartum women with a primary diagnosis of an SUD, including OUDs.

Research Round-Up

NIDA Study Finds Disparities in Medicaid Access to Opioid Treatments

A recent study supported by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) published on the JAMA Health Forum concluded that, in the "...rates of OUD medication treatment and opioid-related overdose varied substantially across and within states." The study found that "...cross-state OUD prevalence ranged from 0.6% to 9.7%, rates of OUD medication treatment from 17.7% to 82.8%, and rates of OUD-related overdoses from 0.3% to 10.5% across states." Findings from this study highlight how expanding access "... to all types of medication for OUD should remain an important goal for state Medicaid programs." These findings also suggest that further research is required to "...identify factors influencing claims-based OUD prevalence and rates of OUD medication treatment and overdose."
