White House Happenings

Biden-Harris Administration Releases Proposed Fiscal Year 2025 Budget

On March 11, President Biden released the Administration's budget for fiscal year 2025 (Oct. 1, 2024-Sept. 30, 2025). SAMHSA's Congressional Justification includes the following funding levels for NASADAD's priority programs within the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA):

- Substance Use Prevention Treatment and Recovery Services (SUPTRS) Block Grant: \$2,008,079,000 (level compared to FY 2023)*
 - The budget includes a 10% set-aside for recovery support services.
 - The budget request includes a proposed update to the HIV set-aside language. Under this proposal, SAMHSA would use HIV cases as opposed to AIDS cases to calculate the HIV set-aside in the SUPTRS BG.
- State Opioid Response (SOR) Grant: \$1,595,000,000 (+\$20 million compared to FY 2023)
- Strategic Prevention Framework-Partnerships for Success: \$135,484,000 (level compared to FY 2023)
- Medication-Assisted Treatment for Prescription Drug and Opioid Addiction: \$111,000,000 (level compared to FY 2023)
- **Drug Courts:** \$74,000,000 (level compared to FY 2023)
- Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT): \$33,840,000 (level compared to FY 2023)
- Pregnant & Postpartum Women: \$43,931,000 (+\$38.931 million compared to FY 2023)
- Community Mental Health Services Block Grant: \$1,042,571,000 (+\$35 million compared to FY 2023)

*Note: final fiscal year 2024 numbers are not available, so totals are compared against fiscal year 2023.

The White House Challenge to Save Lives from Overdose "... is a nationwide call-to-action to stakeholders across all sectors to commit to save lives by increasing training and access to life-saving opioid overdose reversal medications." Stakeholders would commit to take actions in their everyday lives to promote opioid overdose prevention, such as training employees on the proper use, safe storage, and distribution of opioid overdose reversal medications. Commitments are welcome from any organization across all industries and expertise. Capitol Hill Happenings

Fiscal Year 2024 Appropriations Update

The House and Senate passed under suspension of the rules, and President Biden signed on March 1st, another short-term funding bill for fiscal year 2024, the <u>Extension of Continuing Appropriations and Other Matters Act</u>, 2024 (H.R.7463)/(P.L.118-40), averting a government shutdown. This continuing resolution maintains the "laddered approach" implemented by Speaker Mike Johnson (R-LA) of having two separate funding bills composed of subsets of the 12 annual appropriations bills that need to be passed to fund the government.

The House and Senate passed under suspension of the rules, and president Biden signed on March 9th, the <u>Consolidated Appropriations Act</u>, <u>2024 (H.R.4366)/(P.L.118-42)</u>, which provides full-year funding through September 30, 2024 for: Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies; Commerce, Justice, Science, and Related Agencies; Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies; Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies; Military Construction, Veterans Affairs, and Related Agencies; and Transportation, Housing and Urban Development, and Related Agencies.

The new deadline for the second set of bills (Defense; Financial Services and General Government; Legislative Branch; Homeland Security; Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies; and State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs) is March 22.

Lawmakers plan to take up the second package by the March 22 deadline to avoid a partial government shutdown.

Around the Agencies

SAMHSA Launches the SAMHSA Program to Advance Recovery Knowledge

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) recently launched the SAMHSA Program to Advance Recovery Knowledge (SPARK). SPARK is the new national technical



assistance center that seeks to partner with States and other stakeholders to promote equitable access to recovery-oriented systems of care and recovery support services, especially in underserved and under-resourced populations. SPARK is supported by SAMHSA's Office of Recovery (OR) and Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT). SPARK's services include:

- "Support to implement and sustain recovery-oriented systems of care
- Consultation and strategies to advance equitable access to recovery supports and services
- Organizational and leadership development
- Infrastructure and capacity development
- Other consultation to advance recovery-oriented supports, services, and systems"

SPARK also announced that it is launching new training and technical assistance opportunities to expand recovery supports and services, including direct consultation. Visit SPARK's webpage to submit a request or learn more.

New SAMHSA Report: Examining the Use of Braided Funding for Substance Use Disorder Services

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) recently released a report on *Examining the Use of Braided Funding for Substance Use Disorder Services*. This report outlines State and federal laws and policies that support braided funding to provide substance use disorder (SUD) services. In particular, the report highlights best practices for the use of braided funding to optimize resources, improve patient outcomes, and promote funding sustainability for SUD programs. The report contains eight case studies on the use of braided funding from State and local officials across multiple agencies.

CMS Releases CMCS Informational Bulletin on Strategies to Improve Delivery of Tobacco Cessation Services



On March 7, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid
Services (CMS) released a Center for Medicaid and CHIP Services (CMCS) informational
bulletin on <u>Strategies to Improve Delivery of Tobacco Cessation Services</u>. The
informational bulletin highlights State strategies to improve the delivery of tobacco
cessation services for Medicaid and Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)
beneficiaries, as well as the burden of smoking and smoking-related diseases in the
Medicaid and CHIP population. The bulletin also provides an overview of tobacco
cessation coverage requirements and authorities in Medicaid and CHIP, in addition to
details on quality measures and resources for Medicaid and CHIP agencies to evaluate the
effectiveness of tobacco cessation services.

New CoE-PHI eLearning Module: Part 2's Medical Emergency Exception

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration-funded (SAMHSA) Center of Excellence for Protected Health Information (CoE-PHI) recently released a new eLearning module on <u>Part 2's Medical Emergency Exception</u>. This module is designed to help providers of substance use disorder (SUD) services identify what constitutes a medical emergency and who may receive SUD treatment records pursuant to 42 CFR Part 2's medical emergency exception. Specifically, the module's learning objectives are to:

- "Describe what constitutes a medical emergency
- Identify when the medical emergency exception applies
- Explain who may receive records pursuant to the medical emergency exception
- Recognize how to obtain additional resources related to the protected health information through the CoE-PHI"

Research Roundup

NIH-Funded Study on Adolescent Delta-8-THC and Marijuana Use in the US



A National Institutes of Health (NIH)-funded study published in JAMA Network on <u>Adolescent Delta-8-THC and Marijuana Use in</u> the US examined the prevalence of self-reported delta-8-

tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) and marijuana use among 12th-graders in the US. The study is based on an analysis of data from NIDA's 2023 Monitoring the Future survey, which included questions on delta-8 for the first time. The study found that 11.4% of the 2,186 12th-grade students polled self-reported delta-8-THC use in 2023. Key findings include:

- Among the 12th-graders who reported delta-8-THC use in the past 12 months, 68.1% used delta-8-THC at least 3 times, 35.4% used it at least 10 times, and 16.8% used it at least 40 times in the past 12 months
 - Past 12-month delta-8-THC use varied by US census region: 14.6% in the Midwest, 14.3% in the South, 10.1% in the Northeast, and 5.0% in the West
- 90.7% of the 12th-graders who reported delta-8 use in the past 12 months also reported marijuana use in the past 12 months
 - 30.4% of the 12th-graders reported using marijuana over the past 12 months
- Delta-8-THC use prevalence was lower in States with adult-use marijuana legalization versus those without (14% vs 8%)
- Delta-8-THC use prevalence was lower in States with delta-8-THC regulations (14% vs 6%)
