HHS Proposes Changes to CY 2025 Medicare Physician Feed Schedule Proposed Rule to Expand Access to SUD and Mental Health Services

The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), through the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), recently proposed new policies within the <u>calendar year (CY)</u> 2025 Medicare Physician Fee Schedule (PFS) proposed rule that include provisions to expand access to substance use disorder (SUD) and mental health services. The proposed policies are directed at allowing better integration of SUD and mental health specialty treatment into primary care and other settings. Proposed changes include:

- "New, separate payment and coding for practitioners who are assisting people at high risk of suicide or overdose, including separate payment for safety planning interventions and post-discharge follow-up contacts.
- New payment and coding for use of digital tools that further support the delivery of specific behavioral health treatments.
- New payment and coding to make it easier for practitioners to consult behavioral health specialists.
- For Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs), new codes for FDA-approved medications for the treatment of Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) and known or suspected opioid overdose, increased telecommunication flexibilities for periodic assessments and methadone treatment initiation, and an increase in payment for intake activities to provide more comprehensive services for the treatment of OUD, including assessing for unmet health-related social needs, harm reduction intervention needs, and recovery support service needs."

CMS is seeking <u>comments</u> on whether coding and payment for Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP) services under the PFS would be appropriate services in additional settings, as well as on facilities that offer crisis services. The 60-day comment period for the CY 2025 PFS proposed rule (CMS-1807-P) ends September 9, 2024.

SAMHSA's Provider Clinical Support System - Medications for Alcohol Use Disorder Releases Education and Training Opportunities

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)-funded <u>Providers Clinical Support System - Medication for Alcohol Use Disorder (PCSS - MAUD)</u> released a series of free <u>education and training resources</u>. These resources are intended for multidisciplinary healthcare professionals and counselors and describe opportunities to improve access to and quality of prevention, treatment, and recovery support services for people with alcohol use disorder (AUD). Resources include online training modules, enduring trainings, live events, digital resources, and videos related to strategies for addressing AUD. PCSS-MAUD will update these resources in real-time. Continuing Medical Education and Continuing Education credits are available.

NIDA Funding Opportunity: Device Based Treatments for Substance Use Disorders

The National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) recently announced a new funding opportunity for <u>Device Based Treatments for</u> <u>Substance Use Disorders</u>. This opportunity aims to accelerate development of devices to treat substance use disorder (SUD) by supporting research into safe, effective neuromodulatory or neurophysiological devices to treat SUD. Specifically, NIDA is



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seeking research on "... the neuromodulatory and neurophysiological intervention's function... both the delivered dosage/treatment duration and the proposed mechanism of action of the intervention and... if the intervention target has been modulated." Applications may focus on the pre-clinical or clinical development and testing of new devices or existing devices approved for other indications and may also evaluate the mechanism of action of a device.

NIDA will offer awards of up to \$500,000 in direct costs for each year of the UG3 phase for a five-year project. The number of awards will be contingent upon appropriations. Applications will be considered on a rolling basis and are due by August 14, 2026.

NIDA Survey Examines Americans' Perceptions of OUD Treatment Access in Primary Care Settings

A National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA)-backed survey published in JAMA Network on <u>Knowledge, Attitudes, and Beliefs About Opioid Use Disorder Treatment in Primary</u> <u>Care</u> found that the majority of Americans are unaware that primary care physicians (PCP) can prescribe medications for opioid use disorder (MOUD). Specifically, the survey found that 61% of the Americans polled are unaware that PCPs could prescribe MOUD, with 13% believing that they could not access MOUD from a PCP. Other key findings include:

- "Among respondents who reported ever misusing prescription or illicit opioids, 50.6% said they would be very comfortable and 30.7% would be somewhat comfortable personally seeking MOUD from their PCP.
- Of the respondents with no history of opioid misuse, 31.9% said they would be very comfortable and 42.0% would be somewhat comfortable referring someone they cared about to their PCP for MOUD.
- In aggregate, Black respondents were most likely to believe they could not receive MOUD at a PCP.
- Most respondents agreed (658 [53.9%]) or strongly agreed (309 [24.9%]) that a PCP office should be a place where people can receive OUD treatment."

The authors note that the findings reveal important information disparities that impede access to treatment and call for increased awareness of MOUD and how to access them using culturally appropriate strategies to reach diverse groups.

PCSS-MAUD Webinar: Harm Reduction and Non-medication Approaches to Unhealthy Alcohol Use

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)-funded <u>Providers</u> <u>Clinical Support System - Medication for Alcohol</u> <u>Use Disorder (PCSS - MAUD)</u>, in collaboration with the Addiction Technology Transfer Center



(ATTC) - University of Missouri - Kansas City, is hosting a webinar on <u>Harm Reduction and</u> <u>Non-medication Approaches to Unhealthy Alcohol Use</u>. This no-cost webinar is on July 22, at 12:00 pm ET. The webinar will offer best practices for integrating non-medication treatments for alcohol use disorder (AUD) involving harm reduction philosophies into various healthcare settings. Specifically, the webinar aims for participants to be able to:

- "Define harm reduction, describe the principles of harm reduction practice as they apply to unhealthy alcohol use;
- explain harm reduction strategies that can support individuals with unhealthy alcohol use; and
- explain harm reduction program models that can support individuals with unhealthy alcohol use."

ORN Virtual Learning Community Cohort: Guiding Principles of Recovery

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)-funded Opioid Response Network (ORN), in collaboration with Faces & Voices of Recovery, is hosting a virtual training on *Guiding Principles of Recovery*. This no-cost virtual training is on July 24, at 2:00 pm ET. Part of ORN's Virtual Learning Community Cohort series, this webinar is designed to enhance participants' understanding of recovery by exploring definitions rooted in lived experience and evidence-based components of recovery for people with substance use disorder (SUD). Specifically, the training will outline ten guiding principles of recovery, four key dimensions that support a life in recovery, and how those concepts can be used to advance recovery opportunities in communities.
